Community Leadership

The innovations are solutions coming from the community itself to address challenges they face.



Sense of Innovation Ownership

The innovators come from the community and work with their community to make the innovations their collective work.



Preserving the Local Knowledge

The disaster management and climate change adaptation initiatives consider indigenous knowledge, such as the growth of gadung tree (*Dioscorea hispida*) in Ngudi Mulya as a sign of the first season of planting (the beginning of the rainy season).



Continuous Learning

Innovators and YEU keep on receiving inputs and community feedback to improve the quality of the program and innovations.



Celebrating Local Champions

Local leadership is set as an example with recognition at the national and international levels, such as Doddy Kaliri of DIFAGANA DIY.



Cross-sectoral Partnership

Ensure innovation sustainability through the support from pentahelix actors (the academia, the business sector, the community, the media, and the government), for instance through networking opportunities and public hearing events.



Peer Learning

Sharing of knowledge and good practices to develop innovations, e.g. by inviting fellow innovators to facilitate training events in their field of expertise.



Meaningful Participation of Groups at Risk

Older people, women, and persons with disabilities take part in decision making for innovation development, not merely beneficiaries.



Adapting to Change

YEU strengthens the implementation of the innovations by providing flexible support tailored to innovators' needs, such as through additional funding and special training on advocacy.

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
